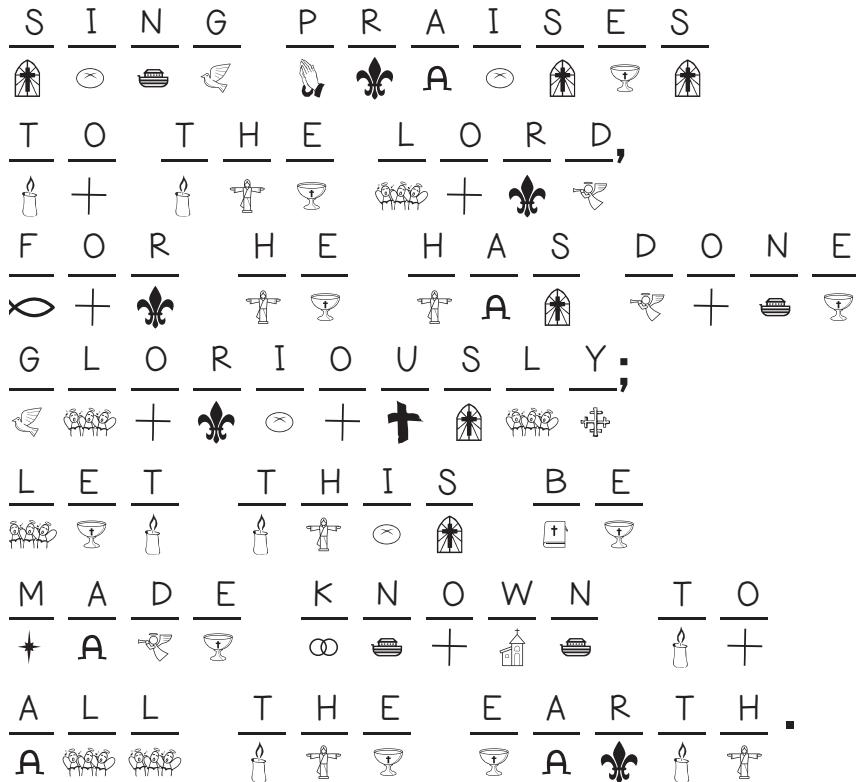
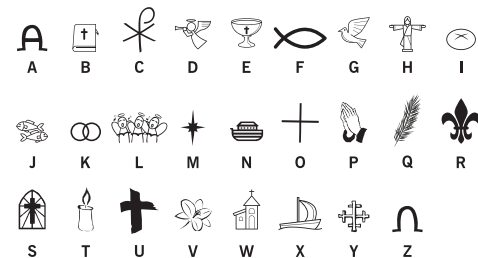

DID YOU KNOW?

Cantate comes from the Latin translation of the first line of the introit (Cantate Domino), meaning “Sing to the LORD.” (Psalm 98:1)

MONDAY — THE PSALM

Read Psalm 66:1–8

What can be said about God? (verses 1–4)

God is so great that all of creation worships and praises Him. And, so great is His power that His enemies come cringing to Him.

What two Biblical accounts does verse 6 reference?

The parting of the Red Sea for His people Israel to cross on dry ground. (Exodus 14:22)

Israel crosses the Jordan during a flood with the ark of the covenant. (Joshua 3:14–17)

TUESDAY — THE OLD TESTAMENT

Read Isaiah 12:1–6

What are the characteristics of the LORD GOD described in verse 2?

God is my salvation, He saves us. God is trust-worthy, He keeps His promises.

What does it mean to “draw water from the wells of salvation”?

Luther: With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. After the word of the Gospel has been preached and the voice of rejoicing has sounded forth, there follows the discernment of spirits and the distribution of the gifts of the Spirit of which 1 Corinthians 12:4 speaks. Christ says in John 7:38: “He who believes in Me, out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water.” Waters denote the Holy Spirit, as in John 4:10. In the noonday heat spring water and running water are the most refreshing. So it is in the scorching heat of sin. The comfort of the Holy Spirit through the Word of God is then most sweet. The wells of salvation are the Gospel, sermons about Christ in various places, or even the preachers of the Gospel. In that day, when the waters will have flowed out to many because the Gospel has already been preached, there will follow also in others the praise, that is, the sacrifice which you have.

WEDNESDAY — THE GOSPEL

Read John 16:5–15

Who is the Helper? (verse 7)

The Holy Spirit

What will the Holy Spirit convict the world of? Why? (verses 8–10)

Sin (of unbelief because they do not believe in Jesus), righteousness (because Jesus goes to the Father and they will no longer see Him), and judgment (because the ruler of this world is judged).

THURSDAY — THE EPISTLE

Read James 1:16–21

What is verse 17 telling us?

God provides our Daily Bread (everything that we need).

The Fourth Petition of the Lord’s Prayer’s explanation tells us: Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

What is meant by “quick to hear” and “slow to speak”? (verse 19)

“We should be more inclined to hear God’s Word than to speak.” (Spangenberg, *The Christian Year of Grace*, page 191)

What is meant by “slow to anger”?

We are not to be quick to show wrath, but show mercy.
