

CATECHISM CONNECTION: First Article of the Creed with Explanation

COLLECT OF THE WEEK

O God, through the humiliation of Your Son You raised up the fallen world. Grant to Your faithful people, rescued from the peril of everlasting death, perpetual gladness and eternal joys; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DID YOU KNOW?

Misericordias Domini comes from the Latin translation of the first line of the introit (Misericordia Domini plena est terra), meaning "The earth is full of the tender mercy of the LORD."

The word "pastor" comes from the Latin noun *pastor* which means "shepherd" and the verb *pascere* which means "to lead to pasture, set to grazing, cause to eat."

Pastors are under–shepherds of Christ, they are instructed to feed (administer the Holy Sacraments) and preach the Gospel to their sheep (congregation) according to Christ's example.
