MONDAY — THE PSALM

Read Psalm 19

List some of the different names of God's Word used in this psalm. How do the names describe God's Word? (verses 7–9)

Law — It is perfect and gives life to the soul. (verse 7)

Testimony — It is true and can make a simple person wise. (verse 7)

Precepts — It is right and brings joy to the heart. (verse 8)

Commandment — It is pure and gives us light to live by. (verse 8)

Rules — It is true and righteous, more valuable than any other possession (verse 9)

What three things does David ask for in verses 12–14?

Cleanse him from hidden faults. — Asks God to forgive the sins that were committed unintentionally (by accident).

Keep him from committing presumptuous (willful and intentional) sins. — Asks God to keep us from sinning on purpose.

Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight. — Asks that everything he does be pleasing to God.

TUESDAY — THE OLD TESTAMENT

Read Exodus 20:1–17

Think of the Ten Commandments as a summary of the good things your heavenly Father gives to you. What are these gifts?

In the First Commandment, "You shall have no other gods," the Lord is saying, "I give you Myself and all that I am for you!"

In the Second and Third Commandments, the Lord gives you His Name to call upon and His Word to be heard and believed.

In the Fourth Commandment, you are given the gift of parents and authorities.

Commandments Five, Six, and Seven: You shall not murder, commit adultery and steal — these are the gifts of life, spouse, property and possessions.

The Eighth Commandment: You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor — this is the gift of reputation and a good name.

The Ninth and Tenth Commandments: You shall not covet your neighbor's stuff or his people — these speak of the gift of contentment; of being satisfied with whatever the Lord gives you.

WEDNESDAY — THE GOSPEL

Read Matthew 5:(17–19) 20–26

What commandment does this lesson reference?

The Fifth Commandment — You shall not murder.

What does Jesus mean in verse 22?

You kill others with your words and actions, with your anger. You despise the people around you and so you hate them, curse them, and get angry with them. Your anger is murdering with your heart. It receives the same punishment (eternal death and hell) as physically killing someone.

What does the Lord say we should do? (verse 24)

We are to ask for forgiveness when we do wrong to others. We are also to forgive others quickly (do not hold a grudge) when they wrong against us, as Christ has done for us.

THURSDAY — THE EPISTLE

Read Romans 6:(1–2) 3–11

What do verses 3–4 mean?

We were buried with Christ by baptism into death, united with Him in a death like His. Baptism clothes us in His righteousness. We wait to be united with Him in the resurrection to come.

While you wait to be united with Christ, God visits you with gifts of grace. He renews your heart and mind in His Word. He restores your faith and hope by His Body and Blood. He answers your prayers. He provides you with the preaching of the Law and the Gospel, holy Absolution, the Sacrament of the Altar, the witness of the saints, the confession of the fathers, the doctrines of the Church, the liturgy, hymnody, and the fraternal love and friendship of your brothers and sisters in the faith. All that you need, He provides you, that you would not fall; that you would, even now, enjoy and benefit from His perfect righteousness and be a blessing to others, that you would submit to His Word and receive His righteousness.
