Read John 18:1-19:42

Where was Jesus arrested? (verse 18:1)

The Garden of Gethsemane

To whom was Jesus taken to? (verses 12–14, 24, and 28)

Jesus was first taken to see Annas, the high priest. Annas sent Jesus bound to Caiaphas, the high priest. Caiaphas then sent Jesus to Pilate.

What crime was Jesus being charged with? What was Pilate's verdict? What was the crowd's reaction? (verses 28–40)

They said Jesus was an evil doer and wanted Him put to death. Pilate said three times that he found no fault in Jesus. Yet, the crowd insisted that Jesus be crucified.

What happened to Jesus in Chapter 19?

Jesus was flogged (beaten with a whip) and had a crown of thorns placed on His head. After which He was crucified (put to death by hanging on a wooden cross).

Where did the crucifixion take place? (19:17)

Golgotha, which is Aramaic for The Place of a Skull

What inscription was placed on Jesus' cross? (verse 19:19)

Pilate wrote, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews"

What did Jesus say at the time of His death? (verse 19:30)

It is finished. — The atonement for our sins was complete. Jesus paid for our sins with His life.

What happened when a soldier pierced Jesus' side with a spear? (verse 19:34)

Blood and water came out — foreshadowing the Sacraments (holy Baptism, holy Supper) flowing from Christ Himself to the Christian Church
