MONDAY — THE PSALM

Read Psalm 146

What is this Psalm telling us to do? (verse 3)

We should not put our trust in man because man can not save us. We are to fear, love, and trust in God above all things; as only God can save us.

Why should we only trust in the Lord? (verses 6–7)

God is our Creator, He made all things. He richly and daily provides all that is needed. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. (SC: The First Article of the Creed)

The Lord is ever faithful, ever true, ever merciful and kind. He keeps His promises. He has said that He will work all things together for the everlasting good in all who believe in Him. (Romans 8:28).

TUESDAY — THE OLD TESTAMENT

Read 1 Kings 17:8–16

How did God provide for Elijah? (verses 8–9)

The Lord commanded a widow to feed him.

What do verses 13–14 mean?

“Do not fear.” (1 Kings 17:13b). God will take care of you. You may think your back is against the wall, and that there’s no hope, but really, there is nothing to fear. The bin of flour shall not be used up. (1 Kings 17:14b NKJV). For you, this means you will always have a place at the Lord’s Table, and always be able to eat bread in His Kingdom. And the jug of oil shall not be empty. (1 Kings 17:14d). This, for you, means that the Lord will never take back the anointing of your Baptism, the healing of your soul, the forgiveness, and eternal life you received when He said you were His own. And what’s more, the Lord will send rain on the earth (1 Kings 17:14e), which, for you, means that He will pour out on you His Holy Spirit — to restore your hope, to uplift your spirit, to help you look beyond the many things that trouble you, and to cause you to believe that: no matter what you’ve done, or what’s been done to you, no matter what the future may hold for you or your children or your grandchildren, the Lord will continue to take care of you, and lavish you with His love, and sustain and strengthen you. So do not fear. For, as the Apostle writes: If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him also freely give us all things? (Romans 8:31–32 NKJV). If God has taken care of all of your eternal needs in Christ, can you not also trust Him with the temporal things?

WEDNESDAY — THE GOSPEL

Read Matthew 6:24–34

What does verse 24 mean?

“No one can serve two masters.” This is most certainly true, first, because God Himself says it. God is truth. (John 14:6c). God speaks only truth. (Psalm 86:11b, 119:160a). And secondly, you know it to be true, that no one can serve two masters,

from what you have seen and experienced in your life. You can’t report to two bosses; it doesn’t work. Both will demand your best efforts and total devotion. Your heart won’t be in it, for one will receive more from you than the other, and you will be painfully torn until you become unfaithful to one and loyal to the other. Divided loyalties are only divided and not loyal at all.

So too, you cannot covet the things of the world, and love God. The daily bread that God graciously gives, gifts such as: food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like (SC. III: 4th Petition), are quickly made sinful mammon (wealth, property, earthly goods, money, etc.) by the fallen heart. And God is a jealous God (Exodus 20:5b); He desires your complete faithfulness. You cannot serve God and mammon. (NKJV)

Why did Jesus tell us not to be anxious (worry) about our lives, what we will eat or what we will drink, not about our bodies, what we will wear? (verses 25–34)

Your heavenly Father knows what you need; better than you know it yourself. The Lord provides. He feeds His children, not just with bread and meat, but most especially with His righteousness. He gives you what you truly need: the forgiveness of sins, deliverance from death and the devil, eternal life.

THURSDAY — THE EPISTLE

Read Galatians 5:25–6:10

What does it mean to “live by the Spirit” and “walk by the Spirit”? (verse 25)

Living in the Spirit is believing in Jesus Christ. Whoever believes in Christ receives the Holy Spirit and is saved.

Walking by the Spirit is resisting temptations of the flesh (sin) and showing our faith through the love of our neighbor.

What does it mean to reap what we sow? (verses 7–10)

All actions have consequences. If we live according the flesh (our sinful nature), we will reap eternal damnation. If we live according to the Spirit, we will reap eternal life.
