MONDAY — THE PSALM

Read Psalm 50:1–15

What did God instruct in verse 5?

That His faithful ones be gathered to Him and be witnesses to His judgment.

What did God charge Israel with? (verses 7–13)

They were offering sacrifices apart from faith; they were just going through the motions. The sacrificial system was never intended to be the sum and substance of their faith, but as a signpost, an act done in faith of the promise that God would provide His own offering to cover their sins. They had forgotten this, and turned inward, comforting themselves not in the promise of God, but by their own observance of the sacrificial system. Any sacrifice that is given to the glory (the building or puffing up) of oneself is not acceptable to God.

When is it appropriate to offer a sacrifice to God? (verses 14–15)

Sacrifices may be given out of gratitude (thanksgiving) and praise.

TUESDAY — THE OLD TESTAMENT

Read Daniel 7:9–14

Who is the Ancient of Days? Describe him. (verse 9)

God the Father is the Ancient of Days.

His clothing was white as snow, and His hair is white like wool. He sits on a throne that is flaming with fire.

What happened in verses 13–14?

The coming of the Son of Man (Christ Jesus) in glory. Illustrative language for the Last Day when Christ who (currently) sits at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty, shall, from thence, come to judge the living and the dead. (Apostles' Creed).

WEDNESDAY — THE GOSPEL

Read Matthew 25:31–46

Who are the sheep and the goats? How are they separated?

The sheep are the believers. They are placed on the right and go into eternal life with God.

The goats are the unbelievers. They are placed on the left and go into everlasting punishment (or torment) in the eternal fire (hell) prepared for the devil and his angels.

Jesus commends the good works of the sheep. Does that mean they “earned the right” (works righteous) to go to heaven?

No. Works do not save the sheep. Jesus is not giving reasons why the sheep are going to heaven. For there are plenty of unbelievers who also feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, visit the sick, and visit those in prison. The difference is that the works of the sheep are cleansed and sanctified by Christ through their faith in Him, while the works of the goats are not. Christ receives good works done in faith as works done for and to Him: “Without faith (in Christ) it is impossible to please [God].” (Hebrews 11:6a NKJV)

THURSDAY — THE EPISTLE

Read 2 Peter 3:3–14

What is the importance of God's spoken Word? (verses 5–7)

When God speaks, that which He says happens. God spoke creation into existence, and it happened! God speaks His word of forgiveness, and it happens! God will speak on the Last Day and what He says will happen!
